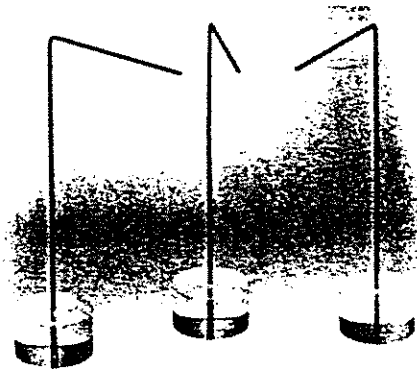

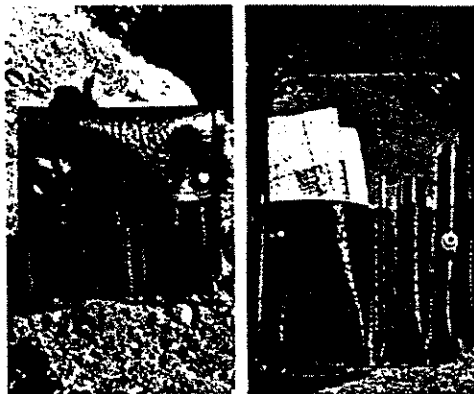

From the editor's desk

## "Lobo" Says

The phone rang and our secretary listened to a voice on the line telling how he had found a cache of gold bars "across the border." The excitement in the voice was ample proof that another dowser had dug in the right spot, and we appreciate the call to let us know another of our students had earned his treasure by conquering the frustrations and numerous setbacks between the Advanced Class and his first recovery. Others are calling to express their appreciation for a class that was taught by an honest-to-goodness professional whose goal was to see dowsing spread instead of counting the dollars taken in from the classes.

Tears of joy rolled down a student's cheeks as she thanked the fellow students who had treated her for heart trouble. Her knees were swollen as large as gallon buckets that afternoon when I asked the class to join me in treating her. Each time she bent over her high blood pressure caused dizziness to such a degree she would almost black out. The swelling in her face, puffy eyes and ankles drooping over the tops of her shoes made attending a dowsing class very miserable to put it mildly. But for some strange reason, Ada knew she just HAD to attend that class.

Iva was a similar case in the Phoenix class on June 4, 5, 6, when once again I asked the class to join me in treating her by the dowsing method. And once again the class witnessed tears of joy rolling down the cheeks of another fellow student who had suffered heart trouble for several years. Both these women received instantaneous healing when the class concentrated on the treatments that lasted no longer than two minutes in either case. Ada couldn't help showing off her knees the next morning because the swelling had completely vanished. Both women looked as if they had a brand new lease on life as the sparkle returned to their pale eyes and big

smiles replaced the haggard appearance of illness.

Then it was Iva's pleasure to join us in the treatment of another fellow student in the same class who suffered from a tumor at the base of his brain. And she knew how he felt as he tried to thank his fellow dowsing friends for the miracle that happened. That night, he told the class the following morning, had been the best night's sleep he had enjoyed in years! Is God involved in dowsing?

In the last advanced class, every student learned to tell the difference between minerals and treasure on their maps. This is the first time ONE HUNDRED PER CENT achieved such success, and it is thrilling to share our knowledge with those who are ready for the advanced training. I demonstrated how the dowser can locate ore that carries as much as 10,000 ounces of gold to the ton, and every student in the class learned that important secret.

We hear from the "can't-ers and the quitters" occasionally who are convinced that dowsing classes are nothing more than a "royal rip-off." That's to be expected because some people just don't have the drive to follow through and learn. They have been failures in everything they ever tried and will never change. Success is habit-forming. Even though I cautioned him about giving the location, he said, "You taught me how to find more than I could ever use. And I have already located enough to last me at least two hundred years!" But this hombre took time out each morn-

ing prior to opening his WESTERN AUTO store to practice an hour with his dowsing rod. He has learned how to achieve success.

Sam Rawson turned in his badge after locating two small caches. That was proof enough for him that he could locate treasures. With the knowledge of dowsing and a new "Lobo" rod, he is in the field right now pinpointing treasures that ordinary treasure hunters have walked over with metal detectors for the past twenty years.

It was a pleasure to listen to him instruct a recent class I was teaching on the importance of experimenting with the easy targets in order to gain experience. Without a background of experimenting, Sam says a person is bound for failure. And he should know because the neighbors in Vancouver, Washington, have almost forgotten his name; they just refer to him as "the dowser."

It is utterly impossible to treat everyone requesting it because we receive letters by the stack asking if we can do anything for a loved one, a relative or for the one writing. The best way to be assured of treatment is by attending classes where periods are set aside especially for that purpose whenever possible. We make a class project of trying to treat the ill, and the results have been fantastic. Many times diseases are healed instantly.

The current drought opens opportunities for the dowser that are seldom seen. Those capable of locating underground water are almost naming their own price. Drilling is seeing a heyday with jobs waiting as far as a year in advance. Some dowsers are turning to drilling for water, giving a guarantee of finding water or refunding every cent of the client's money. So there is no excuse for dowsers being out of work when they are inclined to offer their services to those needing them. Beller it loud and clear, "I'm a DOWSER and proud of it."

Dear Sam:

Since taking your advanced course at La Puente, California, in December, 1976, I have made great progress with my dowsing, so I think it's time I filled you in on some of my finds.

After many hours of practice, going along with your suggestions from class, I dowsed from my home for a pearl ring which had been lost in a lady's home in Tualatin, Oregon, (35 to 40 miles away.) She thought someone had stolen it and supplied me with a photograph of the suspect as well as a picture of her home. The rod soon indicated that it had not been stolen but was still in the house. I dowsed the picture of the house and located the ring in the children's playroom closet.

In early March of this year I received a frantic telephone call from a friend in Portland, Oregon, who teaches with my wife. She had lost \$100 and had searched the house. This lady asked if I would come over and try to find it for her. I went and within about 20 minutes, found the money in her house. Up to this point she had been a disbeliever in dowsing but no more. In fact she is downright respectful because she is quite forgetful and frequently misplaces things.

I was recently asked by a law enforcement agency to help locate some valuable jewelry. Because the owner is up in years, they thought she might have misplaced the jewels. I dowsed in the presence of the peace officer and found, to his satisfaction, that everything had indeed been stolen with the exception of a sterling silver necklace containing fifteen moonstones. We traced that to a fireplace where it had been destroyed. The officer was so impressed he is keeping me informed of any new developments, and I plan to do some more work for him in the future.

Weather permitting, I am going out tomorrow to dowsed for a diamond that my neighbor lost out of her ring in a cow pasture. I expect to locate it.

We recently moved, and many things are still not unpacked. So I save my wife a lot of hunting time by dowsing for her salad molds, silver pieces,

etc. It proves to be excellent practice.

The best "goodie" of all was two weeks ago when I went to East Portland, dowsed and found two glass jars of silver coins. (See the cover of this issue.) The small jar was about sixteen inches in the ground and the quart jar was buried twenty-four inches down. Missed the small one by about six inches from center, but the larger one was right on.

Sam, it is quite a thrill to pick up my new "Lobo" rod and feel it come to life, for if you ask the right questions, it does just that! I think the magazine is the greatest, too. Keep up the good work. Am looking forward to seeing you when you next come to Portland, and will bring the jars of coins to show you.

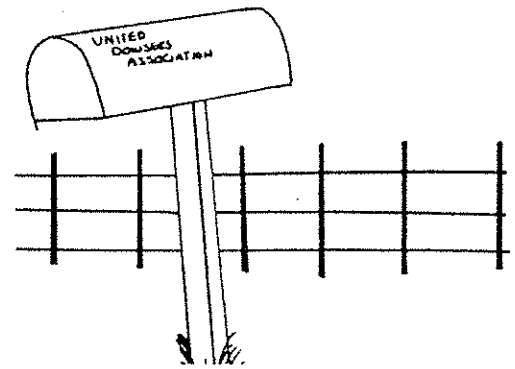

Dear Alma & Sam:

I just now today noticed in UNITED DOWSERS magazine that you were closing the Map Dowsing section of U.D.A., Inc. Well, I for one know you're going to be missed! I have had a lot of maps dowsed—not only by the Wolfes but also by other dowers. Here is how their ratings go: Alma

Wolfe, 95% accurate. Sam Wolfe, 90% accurate. And all other "pro's," 40% accurate, and some are lower than that. What they fall short on is the mental ray, depth of ore vein and ounces of gold per ton. Some "pro's" have given me TWO HUNDRED ounces of gold per ton for an ore vein that had only two or three ounces of gold in it. They gave depth as "surface" when it was actually from twelve to twenty feet to the top of the veins. This is every word the truth!

I won't mention any names because I don't want to enforce anyone, but these Map Experts are well known in dowsing circles, so you see, Sam and Alma are going to be missed!

I have two bunches of maps at UNITED DOWSERS that I plan on using this spring and summer, so get them back to me as soon as possible. Hi, Carl:

**Alma and I work as a team on all maps coming to us, and we remember the packages you have sent as numbering into several. Recover just one tenth of what we located for you, and I am fully convinced you will live on Easy Street the rest of your life.**

**We appreciate your sincerity in rating our dowsing abilities because we have always done our level best on every map that arrived. Everyone makes mistakes occasionally, but nothing short of experience can separate amateurs from professionals. I believe Alma and I can truthfully say we have dowsed more maps than any other persons in these United States, so we were bound to learn a little about it.**

**At the present time there are only a dozen more envelopes containing maps to be dowsed. Although we quit accepting**

**them on March 1, 1977, these arrived prior to that date. So you can see how far behind we were.**

**Our average day is usually 16 to 18 hours, and there is more work arriving all the time. People who are critically ill call on us for treatment by the dowsing method, and there is no end to it. Many times I am still treating them at 2:00 a.m. Then articles must be written for the magazine as I try to recuperate from so much dowsing. Class schedules are tighter than they have ever been as more people become interested in learning dowsing. But Alma and I are trying our best to get all the maps sent back before we hit the road again with more than a two-month duration.**

**I would like to take this opportunity to thank you, Carl, along with thousands of others who put their trust in our map dowsing. Some have found what we marked on maps, others missed a mile or more from finding the locations. We could easily dowse to see whether they found the sites as many sent the maps back for re-checks. There just isn't any way we can take everyone by the hand and lead them to the treasures we found on maps for them. And you can be sure there were treasures that were marked on the maps, then missed.**

**The "Mental Ray" you mention is actually a mental implant that fouls up so many amateurs as they search for treasures on maps as well as in the field. Dowers must learn what they are and discover how to eliminate them before they can hope for success.**

Hi, Sam:

I thought I would tell some of my

dowsing experience in order to share it with my fellow members. I have had plenty of let-downs and could have given up several times. Sometimes the rod would be put up for a day or so, then the fever would hit again.

It has been fifteen months since I took your course in dowsing; you are so right! The first year to year and a half there is nothing for a beginner to do but practice, and it takes a LOT of it! After all the practicing I have done, it is just now starting to take hold, but I am determined to find out what's going on.

After I read UNITED DOWSERS magazine, a lot of things started falling in place. Those magnetic pockets were giving me fits and I needed something to give me confidence because I had tried just about everything.

As you suggested in the magazine, I got out my rod and started locating water lines, natural gas lines, sewer lines and even the underground telephone lines because you said it was good practice. Every line in my own yard was found and I dug down to them for verification. Then I received permission from the neighbors to search for the lines in their yards and found them easily.

Three or four years ago the service lines were installed in seventeen lots near my home. Recently construction was started on them, but the stakes marking the lines had been knocked down; and the workers were having a heck of a time finding them. They dug holes almost everywhere, but they couldn't find the lines. Finally I broke my rod down as you demonstrated in class and went over with the disassembled rod in my pockets so it wouldn't show.

After talking with them for a few minutes, I asked if they would mind if I tried to locate the lines. I quickly got the OK and started putting my rod together. You should have seen them. They looked at me like I had fallen out of a well and hit my head on the pulley. But I went to work and located every one of them.

There was one I found under the driveway, but they said it couldn't be there. So they dug all around and failed. So they finally cut a hole through the driveway where I told them it would be found and soon had

the line located.

I think of my rod as a computer. Feed it the right information and it will give you the correct answer every time. One must learn to keep his own desires out of the way and ask the proper questions.

Sam, I would like to come to your Advanced Class and will try to practice enough to warrant it. I realize what you were trying to tell us about locating the easy targets, and am finally hearing you say, "Don't be in a rush to fall on your face dowsing for treasures. Practice on the easy targets and you will learn quicker."

**Elvin:**

**There is no better practice than throwing an old rusty tin can on the ground, then learning to establish your shadow line so the sun is directly behind you as your rod locks to it. In this position the solar and reflection rays are in line. Mark the shadow line on the ground, then walk around 90 degrees, staying ten feet back of the shadow line on either side. From this position you should detect, and mark, the solar and reflection rays on the shadow line. Halfway between them should be the target.**

**After learning how these**

*Solar Rays*

**rays affect your dowsing and mastering the problem, shut your eyes and flip a quarter onto the lawn. Now if you concentrate on the coin you took from your pocket and sweep the rod correctly, it should be an easy target to find. These are little games that soon teach beginners how to locate those small objects in the field that everyone has trouble with in the beginning. But there is lots of fun in coin shooting with a dowsing rod as the dowser increases his knowledge.**

Dear Sam and Alma,

At 9:30 p.m., C.S.T., Sunday, 17 April, 1977, I called your home and spoke with Alma for 15-20 minutes about the problem Mel Hines of Anchorage, Alaska—your student and my classmate in Basic Dowsing 5,6,7 June 1976 in T. or C.—was having. In his second letter to me he says he has been to your basic course again 8 and 9 January, 1977, in L.A. I'll quote from his letter:

"While there I felt I was doing fine but once I left there, things didn't seem to work out right. How did your dowsing work out? Was the water on the farm in the location you designated?? If you are doing so well, how about some help? If you are positive that you are doing well and would not object to helping me, this is what I'd like. First,

the thing I desire most that I haven't been able to obtain yet is to be a good dowser. Would you please dowse me and find out what I am doing wrong and tell me. As long as this is successful, I am willing to pay, whatever. Would like to hear from you soon, please. I am impatiently waiting for success. This doesn't mean that I'm not practicing or trying. I have started the book, "The Master-Key to Riches." Hope something helps pretty soon."

After reading his letter to Alma over the phone, she suggested that he might be influenced by a NEGATIVE MENTAL ATTITUDE from someone else which is affecting his dowsing once he leaves your class. This is exactly what I'd thought although I did not mention it over the phone until Alma mentioned it. I'd like to quote from "You Can Work Your Own Miracles" by Napoleon Hill, page 23, paragraph 2. "Mental attitude reveals itself from one person to another without spoken words, signs or actions by the medium of telepathy. Therefore, it is contagious." After taking your class I agree with one of your students who says you are the most POSITIVE thinking person he has ever met. On the occasion you first entered my class, I seemed to pick up a strong undercurrent of self-confidence and positiveness. Moreover, after studying "Master-Key to Riches," I must conclude that people who are successful invariably think POSITIVELY. Dear Mel,

In response to your question of my Summer plans, I'm about to set off for the clean, pure air of the mountains to put an end to my hay fever and hopefully to take some saleable pictures with my camera.

I'm glad you received the million dollars I sent!! (That is my valuation for the material contained in Napoleon Hill's books, "Think and Grow Rich" and "Master-Key to Riches.") You are right to start off reading "Master-Key" as it is more straightforward and easier than the other. The only chapter you might want to read right away would be Chapter 13—THE BRAIN—because it gives a good deal of insight

into dowsing—a relative of clairvoyance and telepathy.

I spent 15-20 minutes talking by phone to Alma Wolfe trying to come up with some help for you. Your letter indicates you do well in class, but have problems after you get out. I'd like to quote Sam in UNITED DOWSERS magazine (subscribe if you don't already get it because each issue has contained a "ton" of new information written in clear, concise, easy-to-understand, everyday English) of March, 1977, page 12, column 2, paragraph 5: "Some attend my dowsing classes fully convinced they can't learn. For those unfortunate souls I KNOW they can't unless we can turn their thinking around to I CAN!" You see, Mel, a POSITIVE MENTAL ATTITUDE is everything with regard to the starting point for success! As I have written in my notes from Sam's class, "Dowsing is the power of the MIND." I would elaborate on that to say the MENTAL ATTITUDE you hold in your MIND, whether POSITIVE or negative is the KEY to dowsing SUCCESS or failure. Alma's and my thinking (arrived at independently) is that perhaps you are being unconsciously influenced by a negative mental attitude (CAN'T never did anything) from someone close to you—father, mother, brother, sister, cousin, wife, girl friend or someone else close to you, a hunting buddy perhaps. My mother and brother both told me dowsing would not work when I went out to locate the irrigation well for my farmer friend. I promptly brought in a glass of water and set it on the floor and put the white fiberglass handles on my LOBO rod, showed them how to hold it and asked them to keep an OPEN MIND and concentrate on looking for water. In each case the rod swung down when over the water. My mother admitted that she was not going to let the rod swing down, but, of course, she could not stop it from swinging down when over the water! Just this past week I used my rod (successfully, of course) for two entirely different applications. In the first case my brother who runs a "wheel" business as a sideline was to drive a new customized van over to Austin, Minnesota, on the interstate—about 250 miles. He left at

6:00 a.m. and by 5:30 p.m. still had not arrived back home. Well, I got out the LOBO rod and proceeded to dowse the U.S. Geological Survey topo map index for Minnesota, and located him off the map. Next I went to a map of South Dakota, and located him in Sioux Falls—time 5:30 p.m. I again located him in Sioux Falls, at 6:00 p.m. I told my folks where he was and added that I guessed he was eating supper. (I didn't bother to go to my blackboard and try to dowse for that since I was only interested in his safety and location.) He arrived home at 6:55 p.m. and after checking, I can say that once again my dowsing was correct!

In the other instance we had ordered two new sets of canvas seats and backs to recover a pair of aluminum lawn chairs. We had used one up until the seat started to split last year and the other hasn't been used for 20 years due to the fact that one of my neighborhood "friends" cut the seat when I was a youngster and it was stored away somewhere in the house or garage. Both were covered with a good woven nylon fabric of the same type. That is, the fabric was identical on both chairs. I cut a swatch of fabric from the ripped seat of the chair I could find and put a small piece in the LOBO rod bait-chamber and held the other piece in my left hand. I then proceeded out to the garage (my mother said it was probably out there) and proceeded to get a lock. I moved 15 feet or so to get another angle and got a lock again so I went in the garage and looked. No chair. Then I went out and stood where I had previously been standing and again made the sweep. It locked! I swept again, this time telling myself the chair was NOT there (eliminate the mental implant) and, of course, it did NOT lock. (See how easy it is to let your mind be influenced by someone else's.) I checked around the garage and got another lock. This one I eliminated with my left index finger as it was locking to the remnant ray of the chair I had already found. I then proceeded to the house where I got a lock from four different directions and told my family (it was night) that the chair had to be somewhere in line with a vertical axis

through my location spot. I went upstairs to check my brother's closet and my dad went downstairs to check the basement and found the missing lawn chair exactly in line with my location spot! My mother is a college graduate, and my brother will graduate after summer school (hopefully.) They are both **WRONG, WRONG, WRONG** in saying dowsing won't work. 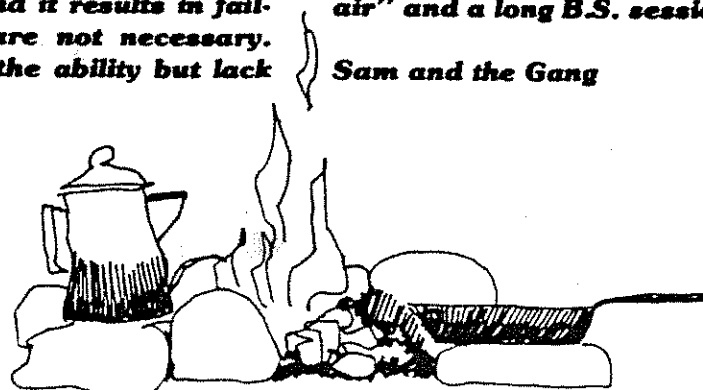
**Too many adopt negative attitudes and it results in failures that are not necessary. They have the ability but lack**

# Questions and Answers

Q. Dear Sam: Cockleburrs were put on the earth for a good reason. What they may be good for is beyond my abilities to determine, but you can do it quite easily by dowsing. I have wondered so many times, what if this was the great cancer remedy? What part of the plant would be useful—the leaves, stalk or seeds? Give it a try, will you? Your nutty friend, David C. Hughes.

A. David: I find the cockleburrr poisonous to human as well as animal with the exception of goats. Worms and a few bugs thrive on them, but my rod tells me they have no medicinal value of any kind. Further investigation suggests they are no more than a nuisance to both animal and human. Maybe one of your fellow members can enlighten us both. I doubt them REALLY being porcupine eggs as greenhorns are told when they view their first porcupine. Best wishes, Sam.

Q. Dear Sam: After meeting you and attending your basic class in dowsing, I trust what you say. But, fella, this bit about healing with the mind is almost choking me to death. I know you won't lie about it, so please, Sam, explain exactly how it works. Name Withheld.

A. Dear Name: I have covered this subject quite thoroughly in my articles on healing in your magazine. The mind can reverse the worst diseases quicker than any method I know of. Terminal cases that have been given up by their doctors have gone home to die, then discovered the miracle in healing themselves by the use of their own mind. You will see doctors turning to this method of treating because they are beginning to learn how effective it really is. Hope the choking eases off. Sam.

Q. Mr. Sam Wolfe: Haven't been able to get the field rod to work. Am trying to use it to locate pockets. Have a gold vein about four inches wide; it won't

lock on it. Also have placer ground, can't get a thing on it. Can you tell me what's wrong? Jacob Kirch, Cle Elum, Washington.

A. Jacob: The problem is just as apparent as the nose on your face. You haven't had any TRAINING in dowsing. A dowser's ability stems from his knowledge, accompanied by ample experiments. You should start by laying a garden hose out across the lawn with the water turned on full force. Hold the rod straight out in front, with the elbow at your side. Then walk SLOWLY across the hose and the rod should pull in the direction of the flow. Walking too fast results in its pulling too late if it pulls at all. So take it as slowly as possible as you walk across the hose while thinking of the running water. This works for almost everyone.

We will be teaching a class in Spokane soon, so maybe you can attend and learn the basics of dowsing. Best wishes. Sam.

Q. Dear "Lobo": Why are Spanish treasures so hard to find? I have searched for them for twenty years but have never made a hit, so I am positive there must be a secret I am unaware of. Could it be that all these sets of symbols really have nothing to do with buried treasures? Thanks. Joe.

A. Joe: Every western state you can name contains Spanish treasure. They are mostly from the Jesuits who were ordered back to Spain during the conquest because they weren't paying the agreed "Royal Fifth." They could not take their treasures back, so what else could they do except bury them? Some contain great hoards of gold and they are usually a safe distance away from the symbols.

Every Spanish treasure that I have ever known of is guarded by death traps of one kind or another. The usual type is large rocks placed in such a manner that they are tripped by the unwary, so any intruder is crushed to death. A friend of mine was almost

caught in a "pit trap" where a pit was dug and sharp rocks pointed up twenty feet below. Luckily, a buddy grabbed his feet as his weight broke a thin sandstone covering over the pit as they crawled back through the tunnel. He still shudders to think how close it was.

The Spaniards were excellent dowers; therefore, to protect their treasures from other dowers they planted hot spots that were actually black sand containing flour gold because it radiates stronger than treasure. Amateur dowers are led AWAY from treasures because they mistake the hot spots for the cache.

The easiest method I have ever found to locate Spanish treasure is to dowse a map of the area. Locate the symbols on the map, then simply ask, "Where do all these symbols lead me?" Just like magic, the rod will pick out the treasure and bypass all the hot spots.

Even when you locate the right place in this manner, there will, no doubt, be more hot spots to lead you astray. If you ask the proper questions which can be found in the contents of UNITED DOWSERS magazines, you can ignore everything but the cache.

There are people who destroy Spanish symbols so nobody else can follow them to the treasures. This is so ridiculous and stupid! I would like to see such people locked behind bars for ten years because such tactics are so unnecessary. A dowser doesn't need symbols to locate treasures, and to him it doesn't matter whether the symbols have been defaced or not as far as his capabilities are concerned.

Joe, you stated the past 20 years hadn't been very productive. I'll bet you learned more from your letter to UDA than all those years trying to decipher the symbols in the field. Wishing you better luck. Sam.

Q. Dear Sam and Associates: Just got my first issue of the UDA magazine and spent all day reading and re-reading it. Man! When I got my Titan Rod and then your book, and now your magazine, I've been a busy man. Hope to take your basic class early this spring.

I have just one question that I would like you to answer at this time if you will. How does one locate death traps when searching for Spanish treasures? There are some people here who are looking for one of the big Spanish treasures and they have talked to me on numerous occasions. In fact, they want me to join them, but before doing so, I need more information on the death traps.

Dowsing is new to me, but from what I have found out, I should have gotten into it a long time ago. Whatever time you have to explain this will be greatly appreciated. Sincerely, Coleman Bennett, Marfa, Texas.

A. Coleman: The easiest method of locating death traps, whether connected with Spanish treasures or any place else, is to simply dowse for them. I chart out the tunnels dug by the Spaniards, then ask where the death traps are. The rod points them out as easily as it would an underground river. Mark each one as they are found until the rod will lock to no more. Wasn't that easy?

I have nothing more than your letter to go on; however, I don't think you will uncover a treasure at the present site. My rod tells me it is almost a mile southeast. Best wishes on your venture. Sam.

Q. Dear Sam: Most dowsers think it is necessary to use a sample of whatever they are trying to find as a bait for their dowsing rods. You teach that it isn't necessary. Would you please explain so I can throw away this box of samples instead of packing it to the field every time I go prospecting or treasure hunting? Thanks. Ed Foster.

A. Hi, Ed: Wind up tight and let 'em fly because a dowser who hasn't learned better than to tote a box of rocks around in the field to use for baits just ain't got much dowsing smarts. It's the MIND that baits a dowsing instrument, not the bait one ties to the end or places in a bait chamber. So don't be sold a bill of goods.

To give an example: if we wanted to dowse the moon for underground streams of water, we might tell our-

selves it would be necessary to have a little hunk of moon so we could concentrate on it. Then we might imagine a sample of water was needed. But the truth is, there are NO underground streams of water on the moon. It doesn't rain there, and the moon is not watered by a mist as the world was prior to the flood that Noah built his ark for.

One of these days our government will discover there is no life on the moon in any form—after spending all that money trying to find out by the test tube method. All they had to do was ask any old dowser who knows straight up about dowsing and they could have had the answer before plans were laid for the first moon shot. But there are other planets that DO have life in human form and it's a cinch to tell those that do from those that don't. All we need to do is ask the question and let the dowsing instrument provide the answer. The mind baits the instrument automatically by concentrating on the question asked. Rocks and stuff as bait. FOOEY! Sam.

Q. Dear Sam: I recently read about dowsers claiming they could move water underground by tapping on a rod driven a little way into the ground. Now I'm open-minded, but does this really work? Frank Parker.

A. Frank: I have heard this same claim, and if these dowsers can show me how it's done on the surface, they

might convince me that it's possible underground. In other words, can they do the same thing to a stream that ISN'T underground?

My dowsing rod tells me the stream doesn't actually move as these dowsers believe, but an edge of an underground stream was hit, the passageways were blocked off by drilling, driving a sand point or by some explainable method. It wasn't the beating of the rod on top of the ground that resulted in the stream moving, but the vibration helped clear the passageways. Sometimes wells are dry until they stand for a day or so after being drilled, then miraculously clear themselves and water enters the borehole. But if there actually are dowsers who can move streams on the surface, they could certainly play havoc if they put their ability to work on some of the streams that mark international border lines. Thanks for writing. Sam.

Q. Howdy, Sam: My father suffers from arthritis to the point where he is of a mind to retire. Is his arthritis as bad as he claims it is? Name Withheld.

A. Hello, Name: Your father definitely suffers more than you realize, both mentally and physically. He should have been treated for the disease long before it settled in his joints. Gonorrhea is easily cured when treated in the early stages. It's a bearcat by the time it settles in the joints. Sorry to bring bad tidings, but it's a fact. Sam.

# The Importance of Concentration

By "LOBO"

Total concentration is as hard for most people as trying to sit perfectly still when there is a spot somewhere with a bad itch. The mind is never still but tends to bounce around from one thought to another in its never-ending curiosity. In dowsing it is important to grasp onto a single thought and hang on to it without allowing the mind to wander. Inability to concentrate results in failure for the dowser because the mind really locates whatever is being dowsed for regardless of the instrument used.

Dowsers of the earlier vintage generally concentrated on finding underground water and the majority of them became quite proficient. Lately the trend has changed to dowsing for minerals, treasures, missing people, oil and a host of other things. There are very few modern dowsers who decided to learn just so they could locate underground water. But they are finding it harder to master dowsing because their interests cover a broader range.

Take a typical treasure that was buried in the back country and try applying dowsing to make the location. How does one go about it? Is there a special method that must be followed, or can the dowser visualize gold in order for his instrument to point out the cache? Let's take a look at the problem in order to learn what causes some people to succeed while others fail.

We have learned from childhood that gold is a valuable metal, so that thought automatically associates gold with treasure. This is where the knowledge of precious metals causes dowsing to backfire and mineral deposits are discovered instead of buried treasures. We must train our minds to reject all precious metals and concentrate on anything that was valuable enough to hide or bury. Only then will we be capable of making the distinction because we have been able to break the tie of gold being associated with treasures. Our mind accepts the

fact that there is actually a difference.

When the mind separates one from the other, it is beneficial to deepen our concentration of treasures to the point where they can be visible to our mind's eye. What does a treasure look like? Is it a mere smattering of flour gold scattered all over the area, or is it a container that holds the valuables together?

The word, "treasure," actually means nothing in dowsing unless it can be visualized by the mind. What does the container look like? Is it a glass jar with a zinc lid, or is it an old syrup bucket that has the bail attached? Sometimes buckets or other metal containers are covered on the outside with tar to withstand rusting. Before the tar was applied, many metal containers were wrapped with burlap, then the container was dipped into a tar vat in order to completely seal the surface. Such thoughts enter the dowser's mind as it tries to convey the message to our conscious mind.

Deep concentration is similar to daydreaming because it allows the mind to shut out all distractions except what we are thinking about. Dowsers who can concentrate to that degree have very little trouble in making precise locations. It's the scatterbrains who have trouble controlling their minds.

Try thinking of an apple tree and see how deep your concentration can be without allowing the mind to drift. Visualize the size of the trunk, the length of the limbs and the color of the leaves. Notice how the wind makes the leaves flutter ever so gently without the slightest trace of violence. Look at the little green apples hanging onto the tiny tips of the limbs and allow your mind to wander to a time when these small fruits will look so big and inviting, all dressed in beautiful deep red. Allow your taste buds to sample the sweet tangy fruit as your ears pick up the crackling sound of your teeth biting deep into a beautiful big red apple.

Early in the morning allow your thoughts to drift to the fresh dew drops hanging from the tips of the leaves as the sun comes over the horizon. Feel the tiny droplets striking your face in the midnight air when the dew was falling, and look at the stars twinkling through the branches of the tree limbs.

The tree has produced its fruit for the season and now it's time for the pickers to strip it along with all the other trees in the orchard. You look at the bark and wonder how God created the tree with all its uses for people to enjoy. A woodpecker has extracted insects from the inner bark and you see the tiny holes made by its tappity-tapping, as its beak drilled an erratic pattern.

As the insect was removed, you see the woodpecker fly away toward its nest where a nest full of hungry mouths await the morsel that is always too small to satisfy their appetites. Soon the bird returns and the tapping noise starts again.

The ground around the trunk of the tree is free of weeds due to regular cultivation. Your mind tells you the owner of this orchard takes pride in growing his crop. And the trees respond to superb care like a dog does to a gentle scratch behind the ear, as evidenced by their bountiful crop.

Visualize young lovers sitting beneath the apple tree as they chat about the school prom, a special dance they attended together, and listen to their plans for tomorrow. Hear the girl giggle and watch her run her fingers through her golden curls that bounce back in place to lay ever so lovely down past her small tanned shoulders. Her dress is a cute green color, almost the same shade as the leaves on the tree while the boy's pants resemble the dark gray bark his fingers continually fumble with.

A bug crawls toward the tree over the loose dirt and our minds watch its progress. There are small patches of dust, only to be broken by loose clods

that sometimes give way when the bug tries to reach their summit. Sometimes it manages to catch its balance and climb over the top where it disappears on the other side for a brief moment. Then it tackles another clod with the same results.

It would be easy to write a book about this apple tree, but our objective is to explain how the mind can become engrossed in concentration so deep everything else is shut out. In order to accomplish this it is necessary to give the mind something to keep it occupied. When there is nothing to keep it busy, it searches for other interests until something attracts its attention.

Dowsers who learn concentration, and employ it religiously in their work, usually have a high rate of

success. But there is danger of mentally implanting whatever you are searching for unless care is taken to guard against it.

Take a map for example: the dowser can look at a spot on the map and think, "That's the spot where the treasure was buried," and he automatically implants the radiation of it. The same thing happens in the field and this causes him to make false locations. Such errors can be avoided if the dowser asks himself where the location of a treasure might be within a certain area, instead of allowing his eyes to pick a promising looking site.

Dowsing requires skill in operating the instrument; therefore, the mind cannot be allowed to enter into such deep concentration as we covered with the apple tree. We must ask our minds questions and expect answers

by the action of the dowsing instrument. This requires skill in handling the instrument properly while the mind searches for the hidden object in question.

Merely asking a question is too shallow unless thought accompanies your words. Put the mind in action because that's really what the instrument responds to instead of words. There is no need to speak at all when the mind is employed to do its job.

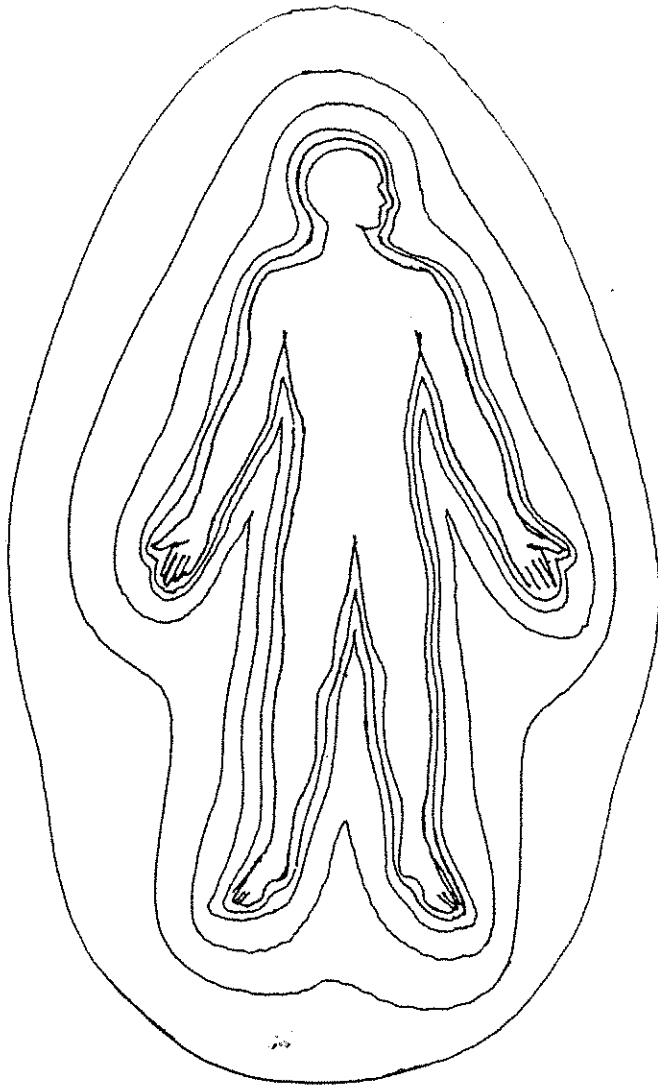
Holding a thought for any length of time is not easy unless visualization is incorporated for the purpose of holding interest. You must discover the area where it is easy to think of a buried treasure without actually concentrating strongly enough to visualize it with the mind's eye. This is the best level for dowsing, and it is only a matter of practice to learn how.

## Dowsing and the Aura

The aura...the etheric body, for years it was considered a myth, the hallucination of some "crazy" people. Yet since the publishing of the book, "Psychic Discoveries Behind the Iron Curtain," in 1970, there has been a renewed interest in the aura. Not only is its existence being accepted by "crazy" people, but also by respected scientists as well. Researchers in prominent universities are photographing and studying this invisible radiation around the human body.

The knowledge of the existence of the aura has been handed down to us since ancient times. For hundreds of years it was only visible to a selected few—"sensitives." These people had developed a special ability which

allowed them to see this second body. Then in the 1920's Dr. Walter Kilner discovered that the aura could be viewed through screens filled with a chemical called dicyanin. He wrote a book called "The Human Atmosphere" and in 1922, his technique received a sympathetic review from the coldly orthodox publication, "Scientific American." Although Kilner did much valuable and scientific research into the aura, interest in his work seemed to fade away.

Other physicians such as Dr. George Starr White used the aura extensively as a diagnostic technique. These men were ridiculed for their belief in the existence of this second invisible body. Radionic practitioners

have long known of the existence of the etheric body and its value in treatments. Radionic broadcast treatments given via the aura are often effective when other methods fail.

The biggest breakthrough for those interested in the aura came as reports leaked through the Iron Curtain that they had photographed the aura. For the first time there was visible evidence of the existence of the aura. Proof of something that just couldn't exist. Scientists began experimenting with this new technique of photography called Kirlian Photography after its Russian inventor. Energy from the pyramids was photographed. Energy emanating from the hands of people with healing powers was observed and photographed. The effects of emotion, alcohol and drugs were observed on this subtle anatomy of man. Probably the most startling discovery of all was the "phantom leaf effect." This gave credibility to the claim that amputees could feel pain in their missing limbs. Even though the physical limb is missing, the aura of the missing limb remains forever. But what role does the aura play in dowsing? Let's take a closer look at this specific area.

Among the people who believed in the existence of the aura although they were unable to actually see it were the dowsers. Some expert dowsers such as the late Verne Cameron were able to "see" the aura with their dowsing instruments. Cameron invented a dowsing instrument which he called the "aurameter." It is especially well suited to detecting the aura. Almost all dowsing instruments can be used to define the outline of the aura, but the best are those along the lines of the aurameter and the angle rods. The procedure for detecting the aura will be described later.

You can easily feel the aura for yourself. Hold your hands about a foot and a half apart with your palms facing each other. Now begin to slowly move your hands closer together. As the palms get closer you will feel a slight resistance. Not much, almost like you were pushing into a ball of goose down. Concentrate on the energy flowing between your hands. If at first you are unable to feel the energy,



keep on practicing. It will come. This is also a good test to see if the radiations are strong enough for dowsing. If you can feel this radiation between your palms, then the rays are strong enough for dowsing.

Another simple way to prove the existence of the aura is to hold a single angle rod in your right hand (if you are right handed.) Have a friend hold his hand open with the palm facing the rod about six inches away. Have him concentrate on causing energy to be emitted from his palm. This is best done by visualizing the energy as a white light flowing through the body and out the palm toward the rod. If you try to sweep the rod in toward his palm, you will find that it is repelled. If the person is able to produce a strong enough flow of energy from his palm, the rod may actually be repelled backward before you begin to sweep in toward the palm.

We are going to look at the procedure for detecting the aura with the three major types of dowsing instruments, namely, the angle rod, the "Y" rod and the aurameter. Many expert dowsers have investigated the aura and have discovered many different facts. As yet all these discoveries have to be pieced together. A little later we'll look at some of the information we have about the aura thus far.

Angle rods: have your subject stand about two feet in front of you looking at you. Hold the rod in your right hand (providing you are right handed) and concentrate on finding the aura. Slowly sweep the rod in toward the subject's body. When you get close, the rod will stop without touching the person's body. If you try to move the rod closer, it simply will not touch the person's body. The aura is a very distinct form of radiation and trying to push the dowsing rod into it is like trying to push the rod through a brick wall.

The "Y" rod: hold the "Y" rod in the usual manner. It should be held at about a 50-degree angle. With your subject standing in front of you, begin to slowly walk toward the person. As the tip of the rod comes to the person's body, the rod will be repelled back toward you and will not touch the other person's body. During this

time you should be concentrating on detecting the aura.

The aurameter: these instructions also apply to the many different dowsing instruments similar in design to the Cameron aurameter. These consist basically of a 4-inch tubular metal handle with a coil of wire extending forward to a weighted pointer. The actual Cameron aurameter has a special spring arrangement in the handle which makes it much more sensitive than those without one. The aurameter is held in the hand with the handle level. The instrument is then moved in toward the person's body. When the weighted pointer hits the aura, it is repelled back and will not touch the person's body. Again you should be concentrating on the aura.

The best way to learn about the aura is through personal investigation and experimentation. Throughout the past hundred years much has been discovered about the aura by various dowsers. Some of the information has appeared to be conflicting, but as a clearer picture emerges, it will all fall into place. A good place to start your investigation of the aura is to review the information available from the work of other dowsers.

According to most researchers there are three distinct auras—the inner, middle and outer auras. Their existence has been known and each is visible through the use of the Kilner aura screens. Through the use of radi-omics Bruce Copen of England has discovered a fourth aura which he calls the spiritual aura. Each of these auras can be detected through dowsing by concentrating on the specific one you want to outline.

The distance that the aura extends out from the body depends on several factors. An important factor is the person's health. Some expert dowsers report that they are able to determine many things about a person's health by outlining his aura. Generally speaking, the farther out the aura projects, the more energy and better health that person has. As you begin to experiment with the aura, you will see that the distance your aura emanates out coincides closely with how your dowsing ability is at that time. Dowsers who are experienced at de-

tecting the aura have found that where there is a change in the symmetry of the aura, either a depression or a shooting out, this indicates a problem in that area. The only way to really get to understand the aura and how to interpret the dowsing instrument's reactions in relationship to it is by experience. As with all areas of dowsing the best way is to learn by doing.

The late Verne Cameron in his extensive research into the aura observed many interesting and unusual things. These include the outlining of a pair of wings—triangle-shaped projections emanating from the subject's back. It is interesting to note that the aurameter was named at the suggestion of the late Max Freedom Long after he had observed its remarkable potential in investigating the aura and thought forms. You will be able, after some practice, to duplicate many of Cameron's findings. It is important to remember that Cameron was very experienced in the use of his dowsing instrument. He had acquired the delicate touch required to detect these subtle radiations. This is obtained only through extensive practice.

Persons able to see the aura report that the color can indicate many things about a person's personality. It is beyond the scope of this article to discuss the meaning of these colors. This information can be found in most books dealing with color of the aura. The interesting thing is that dowsing allows those of us unable to see the aura to detect the color and make use of this interesting information. To do this, simply concentrate on the person and slowly think of the different colors. The dowsing instrument will give a positive reaction when you get to the correct color. The meaning of the color can then be looked up in a standard book on the aura.

In the far east the aura or etheric body is better known than it is here in the west. These people have been studying the aura for thousands of years. They have discovered in the aura what are called chakras. Chakras are made up of three whorls of energy which are capable of receiving and transmitting energy. There are seven major chakras and twenty-one minor

ones. They have a great effect on our health as each has a direct connection to the various physical organs and glands of the body. By dowsing it is a simple matter to detect the malfunctioning chakras. This is done by having the subject lie down on his stomach as the chakras are located on the posterior aspect of the body. Point at the location of each one and concentrate on finding out if that chakra is functioning normally or abnormally. The dowsing instrument will give the correct indication.

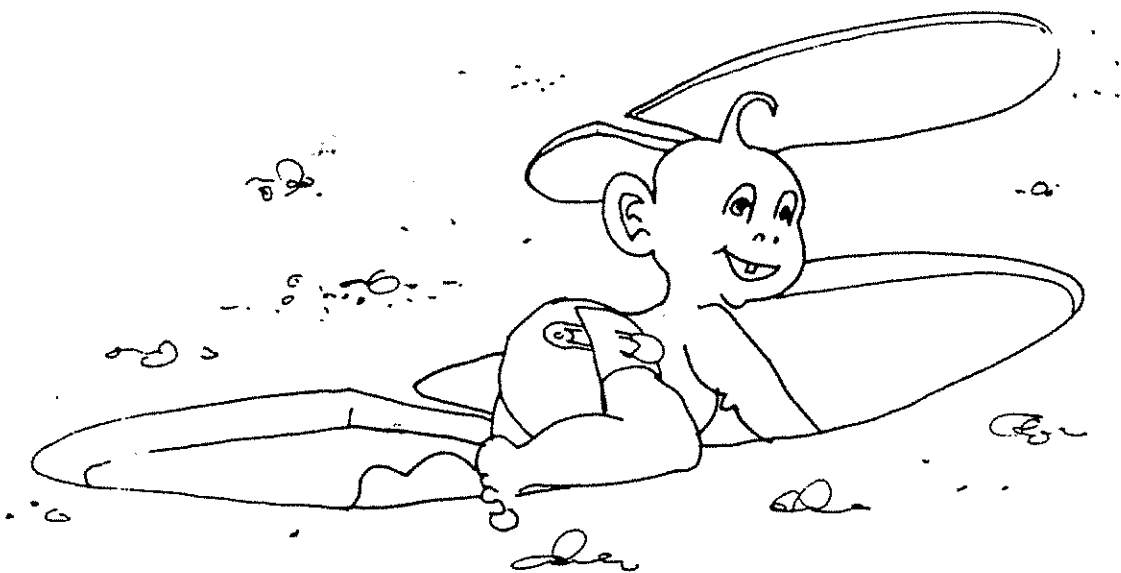
After the malfunctioning chakras have been determined, the next step is to treat them. This can be done in a number of different ways including color therapy and radionics. Of interest to most dowzers is the use of the

dowsing instrument to heal. The same techniques described in the excellent articles by Sam Wolfe can easily be adapted to treat the chakras or even the complete aura. As you treat, concentrate on the specific chakra or part of the aura.

When a disease hits our bodies, it begins in the outer aura and moves inward, finally reaching the physical body where it manifests itself as various symptoms. Since dowsing and radionics are able to detect these invisible energies, it is possible to "forecast" the coming of a disease long before any symptoms surface. The length of time it takes for a disease to move through the aura to the physical body depends on several factors. First is, what the disease is. A common

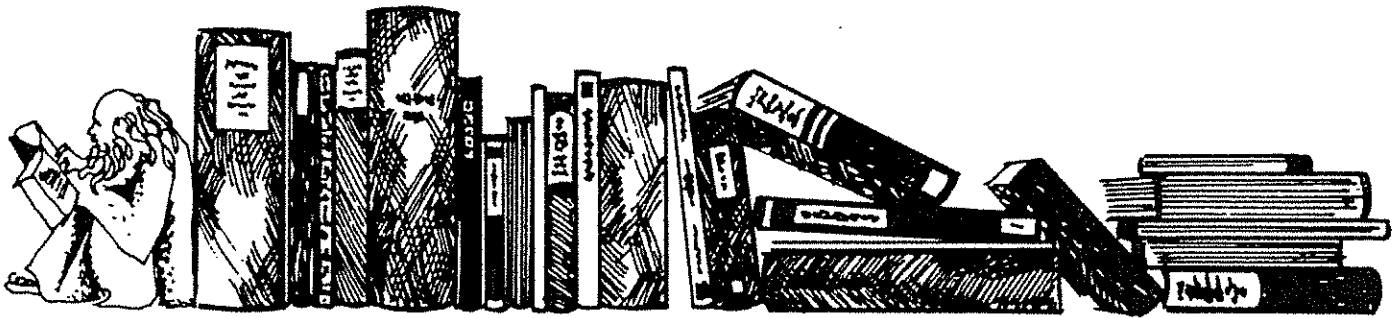
cold, for example, comes on much more rapidly than cancer. Another important factor is the vitality of the person, both in his aura and the physical body. Many diseases are defeated in the aura without ever reaching the physical body.

The aura is an important part of our anatomy. If interest and research into the aura continue, it may well become an important part in medical diagnosis of the future. As more and more dowsing secrets are being unlocked, it is becoming readily apparent that the aura plays an important part in successful dowsing. Investigation of the aura through dowsing offers many fascinating opportunities. It can also help you improve or regain your own health.

# Locate the Easy Targets

The amateur dowser usually wastes valuable time trying to find treasures before really learning dowsing first. He studies treasure magazines and any book that mentions treasure like they were the Holy Bible. Most of the tales are exaggerated out of proportion and far too many have no truth pertaining to buried wealth at all. They are the results of unscrupulous writers hammering on typewriters for the three cents per word paid.

Writing treasure stories is certainly not the easiest method in the world to get rich. Those with enough savvy will be told how to make money in this article by locating water which is a pushover when compared to treasures. Few will follow through and the rest of the dowsers who could utilize their abilities will go on chasing the rainbow to eventual failure.

As this is written, Alma and I are parked in the back parking lot of the Holiday Inn in Boise, Idaho. We are in our Winnebago Motor Home on a training tour. While on the trip we have talked to three different people here in Idaho, who told of people making a wad of money by filing on desert land through the Homestead Act, then drilling a well. Three people made in excess of \$200,000 each, and you could probably do the same thing.

The Desert Land Act allows any American citizen to file on as much as 320 acres of desert land. Husband and wife may file separately and get a full section which is 640 acres. Each child may file for an additional 320 acres, but the land must be improved and enough water brought in to irrigate a percentage of the total acreage. This is usually done by drilling a well.

The cost of drilling is high, so it is not unusual for some large farming company to lease the land, clear the brush, level and drill wells for the first three year lease. Then they turn it

back to the owner, and he or she can sell, rent, lease or farm it themselves. They are the legal owners.

The three people mentioned earlier decided to drill wells and forget about leasing to large companies. In each case, when wells were completed, someone offered a price they couldn't refuse. The lowest figure I heard of was \$200,000 for 200 acres of ground. One brought \$300,000 and another offer of \$500,000 for 400 acres was turned down.

This land really exists and I saw the ground that the half million was offered for. It looks like so much other Idaho land that is covered with sage brush and very little else. But don't underestimate it because some of the best crops grown in the United States come from this same Idaho desert land.

Anyone interested may contact the Idaho Bureau of Reclamation for particulars on the Desert Land Act. Or other Western states have the same program. Choose the state you like best and then check to find out if it has land for homesteading under the Desert Land Act.

The dowser should first check the site for adequate water for irrigation before filing on it. Sometimes artesian water, is available for the asking. When map dowsing, keep artesian water at the head of the list because a farm that is blessed with such a water supply is more valuable than one where every drop must be pumped. And there is more artesian water available than people are aware of.

Artesian streams may not free-flow enough for irrigation purposes, but the water level will be higher than the usual underground streams. Because of this, it is less expensive to pump, but there will probably be a stronger flow. Anything that reduces the cost of water to the user makes the farm more desirable.

Treasure hunting might be more exciting, but let's look at a situation I was engaged in two weeks ago. Many of you figured the classes I teach pay so well; however, you may remember my saying I could make more in the field.

A friend of mine who is a mining engineer and geologist came by one

evening for a chat. This fellow keeps abreast of what is happening in the field, especially in gold mining.

During the conversation he mentioned a large company that had drilled numerous holes in the desert searching for water. They experienced one failure after another, and their need for water was so desperate they had signed a purchase agreement of half a million dollars for one well that is currently pumping 500 gallons per minute. The only problem is, the well is tied up for mining purposes and cannot be sold.

This kind of news to a dowser is like asking someone who is starving if he is hungry. It stands the ears to "attention" because there is no place on earth without a source of water somewhere near.

My secretary hunted up the maps covering the area so I started map dowsing for the largest source of water in that particular valley. Fifteen minutes later the site had been marked along with pertinent information that read: Subterranean water, no contaminants, excellent for drinking. Output 1,900 gallons per minute from six-inch pipe. And the temperature was noted. Depth 74 feet.

The friend asked if it would be possible for me to peg the site to be drilled. So I arranged my tight schedule to include one day for desert work.

In the field we located the water and marked the best place to drill. He will follow through on it, but there was still half a day to kill and I like to utilize my time.

The company he is working for is trying to rework ground that had the values extracted years ago. They needed to locate ore that would pay for a change. So the next two hours were spent going over the property picking out pockets and searching for paydirt.

We found enough to keep the company busy for quite a while; then I located other mineral deposits they were very much interested in. Plans are being made to check them further as time permits. But there was still enough time to utilize and locate more water that we knew could be sold to a parched town in the same

general area. They pipe water from any source that promises enough to allow a few more homes to be constructed, so the demand is no secret.

By checking their pipelines first from a map, I decided to locate a good source of water that would be easily accessible, yet it must be pure enough for drinking purposes. The first map I dowsed revealed a source of pure water that was only 62 feet under the surface. From a six-inch pipe it will yield a whopping 3,600 gallons each minute of every day, 365 days a year. The water is no more than half a mile away from one of their existing pipelines, and it will gravity feed down from a pumping station.

What is a source of water like that working to a croaking town in the desert? We will own the well and sell the town all they can use at so much per thousand gallons. Water in the scorching desert brings more money than it would in mountainous territory where it is so much more plentiful. This is where the knowledge of dowsing pays many times what a class would. This is retirement money that keeps flowing in as the water flows out. You can lay odds that this well would be worth more than an oil well, so the day in the desert offered a change from office work as well as once again proving dowsers can make money when they learn to dowse.

Water is scarce all over America, or that's what we are told. Let's turn that around and say there is ample water if we could force polluters to stop contaminating what we already have. The shortage opens opportunities for dowsers that they wouldn't have otherwise because there is always a demand for fresh water no matter where it's found.

The "Bottle Buff" can have a ball locating old dumps with the dowsing rod and it's as easy as falling off a log backwards. Too much time is wasted trying to research old campsites or ghost towns when all one needs to do is lay a map down and find several quicker than a person in a hurry could visit the backhouse. The dumps can be found within a minute or so from the map, and that certainly isn't exaggerating. For anyone who hasn't tried this method of digging old bott-

les, he couldn't believe how simple it is until he sees it. From the map you can actually find where the houses stood that all the trash came from.

After making locations of several dump sites, it is easy to determine which one holds the most old bottles, or the largest number of rare bottles. By using a scale from zero to 100, try picking the dump that would be the most profitable to dig. And if you haven't tried digging old bottles with a skip loader, you have missed an experience that isn't easily forgotten. Sure, there are lots of broken bottles, but when pickup loads of perfect ones are hauled out, the broken bottles don't seem quite so important.

For those who enjoy hunting mushrooms in the early spring, why not try dowsing for them? Let the rod lead you to those beds that seem out of place as the instrument locks. Don't try to out-guess a dowsing instrument but follow through and be surprised. Before long it is a surprise when nothing is found, so you go back and experiment until you learn what caused the false lock. Maybe the mushrooms are barely under the surface and just haven't broken through the surface. This teaches you to ask for those that are large enough to pick so the instrument passes by the others.

Experiment and see how the instrument indicates poisonous varieties from the edible ones. Having the background of finding food in the sticks could come in mighty handy sometime. I have lived off the fat of the land for weeks on end because my dowsing rod could point out edible foods and water that would have been overlooked otherwise. Remember you can live on almost anything birds or animals eat; however, there are a few exceptions. I hate to think of a diet buzzards might consider a delicacy, and opossums aren't the cleanest animals God ever created. As a general rule it is safe to use it as a rule of thumb; however, the dowsing instrument in the hands of a competent dowser makes the choice easier. The best locations to set traps, snares or even kill a bear can be determined through the use of the dowsing rod.

Culling everything from plants to animals is a cinch and the savings

could mean the difference between profit or loss to the person growing them. A row of trees can be dowsed to determine which are the most productive and which should be removed. This is possible as soon as the young trees are set in the ground while replacements would be a minor problem.

Young animals that are being considered for breeding stock should be culled while they are still babies. Yes, it sounds fantastic that such a thing is possible, but it actually is. The time to cull is before the required investment threatens to become a loss. And the best time is just as early as possible.

A young man considers two girls that he must choose between. Did you realize he can quickly learn which has the best qualities for a wife, mother and homemaker? Girls can make the same decisions about boy friends. Widows can choose the one person that would make them happier than anyone else. How? Oh, you know!

Locating easy targets can apply to anything a person can dream up. Work on the easiest first, and before you hardly realize it, all of them become easy. Nothing short of practice and experience teaches a dowser how to make hard projects become easy. Repetitions of practice are not accidental. It's the only way to realize the success amateur dowsers hope for. Don't be afraid of making mistakes because these mistakes should be welcome as lessons every dowser must learn.

What are your qualifications and what is your goal? Without a goal where can you go? Is there a desire to specialize in a particular field? Dowsing offers you unlimited opportunities that no other field can match. The few things mentioned in this short article are no more than a drop in the big river because if there is a limit to dowsing, I certainly haven't found it.

What planets contain life, and which ones are void? Where do the flying saucers really come from? Can you predict the weather for the next week? These are suggestions for practice that will have you uncovering treasures in the future as easily as finding the answers to the above now. Will you be capable?

# Use Dowsing in Business

Wouldn't it sound silly to call in the local "water witch" by the contractor who wanted to know how high to bid on a particular job? That's exactly what's happening in numerous cases across the country and the results have been astounding. The dowser can find out what the lowest or highest bid is and the contractor has that advantage on his side, so he bids accordingly.

Realtors have found that dowsing can save valuable time locating properties that can be listed without having to canvas an entire area. They simply lay out a map of the surrounding territory and let the rod point out properties that can be listed. Once an owner decides to sell a certain property, THAT information is available to anyone capable of dowsing and can be learned quickly. All it requires is a little time in the back room with the dowsing instrument and a map covering the area of interest.

Real estate salesmen are learning to depend on dowsing to eliminate the "lookers" from the buyers. When someone drops in, they excuse themselves for a brief period that allows them enough time to check the person's qualifications with an instrument in the back room. They can quickly pick the serious buyers from others who would be driven around town at the salesman's expense when their buying power is down to nil. This allows more time to devote to the people who are really potential buyers which results in more sales, and, of course, more profit for the salesman.

Salesmen of almost anything could apply this same system and discourage those who would utilize their time but couldn't purchase a Lincoln if it were offered for old Model T prices. Don't be afraid to check out a potential customer BEFORE spending an hour or two trying to make the sale. Auto salesmen know there is a high percentage of "lookers" for each buyer. Why not put the odds on your side by finding out the qualifications first?

Wouldn't it be nice these days if there were a system that allowed an employer to discover the traits of applicants before they were hired? What is the attendance like, is the person a good worker? Dependability, excessive sick leaves, personality, honesty and a host of other things can be discovered by dowsing.

Mechanics are turning to dowsing to locate problems in automobiles that are hard to pinpoint otherwise. Some of my students own garages; they tell us it's a cinch, and customers are pleased by the lower repair bills due to the reduction in time spent running down the trouble.

Maintenance men are using it in factories because they can pin a problem down in a matter of minutes that may otherwise require several hours. Truckers are discovering the advantage of the dowsing method to eliminate hauling for those who are so hard to collect from. They apply it to mileage, troubles in their rigs that haven't become apparent, and to road conditions to name just a few examples. The word, "dowsing," is spreading through many businesses because it gives advantages others do not have.

For many years a few doctors have secretly used dowsing in their practices because they realize there is no other method of diagnosing disease that is so accurate. It isn't necessary to have a patient present because the dowser picks up the patient just by concentrating on the name. Illness and disease can be found as well as the degree of seriousness. Sometimes patients are charged a small fee for "special tests" that is nothing more than the fee charged by a professional dowser who works for doctors secretly. Many things go on behind the scenes that would amaze some patients who have no confidence in dowsing whatever.

Farmers are learning the advantage of the "witch stick" in various operations. Some use it to determine which fertilizer is needed for certain parcels

of ground, others to locate underground water and still others to treat sick animals. There seems to be no limit to the application of dowsing in business except when used to predict the future or applied for gambling purposes. A farmer who treats his cattle for parasites or his alfalfa for aphids is using the natural force rather than poisons to make his operation safer and so much more profitable. Orchards can be protected by dowsing without the necessity of covering the edible fruits with poisons that no consumer wants nor can use in his digestive system. They could be said to be using the "common sense" method of farming.

Don't be misled into believing there is an actual oil shortage because that certainly is NOT the case. Oil companies are using pressure on the public to force prices up, but the shortage scare has no more merit than Fido yodeling on the moon. There is more profit in making certain gasses and other products from petroleum than there is in gasoline.

The Alaskan oil line will bring crude oil closer to the market than it is now. Already there are rumors leaking out that plans are being made to sell this excess oil to Japan. Isn't it strange that there were gas wars from coast to coast just a year before the crisis shut down service stations clear across the country? Now who is fooling whom? Just as soon as prices reached the intended level the oil companies plan on, there will be plenty for everyone. "Turn your thermostats down," asked the President. I ask you WHY?

Right now 1,025 oil deposits are waiting to be drilled here in these United States. One dowser with a very successful batting average on oil has discovered these deposits, but nobody wants to drill. Then there is the tremendous natural gas deposit that is near a large city suffering from the "shortage," and nobody wants to drill. More gas and oil deposits could be found without much trouble, but where is the market and who would drill?

The answer might be that cities or states may be forced to start drilling oil and gas wells in order to have a

supply without being dependent on established oil companies. I am personally against government engaging in business; however, when large business thinks of nothing other than the un-mighty dollar, maybe it's time for a change. Our petroleum belongs to the citizens of this country instead of a few large companies. With dowsing to make locations it could be produced and utilized by the customer without his being lied to and played with like so many dominos.

Hatcheries cull eggs before they are put into incubators in order to eliminate roosters from being hatched. People rearing small birds for the market need a system that allows making the determination of the sexes before the marking feathers appear. This ability makes the business more profitable and more people are turning to dowsing because it provides the method they need.

Supply and demand can be determined in order that people can choose certain products or crops offering the highest returns on their investments. Weather can usually be determined far in advance because the elements are already in progress that bring storms and droughts. Dowzers who have never tried forecasting the weather have a surprise in store because it actually works! Many times the weather forecast will call for certain conditions and the dowser will find the report contrary to his own. Almost invariably the dowser will prove more accurate.

Weather plays an important role in farming. The dry-land farmer can pick the years that will produce enough moisture for his crops, then skip those too dry for farming and realize much larger profits in the long run. Having this knowledge makes the difference between success and failure in many cases.

Investing in stock markets gives the investor an advantage where supply and demand are the most important factor. Dowsing offers that advantage, providing something is known about the product or crop in advance. Any investor should know something of his chosen stock and what the trend will be if a crop failure comes such as the current coffee crisis. Within sixty days

coffee jumped 700%, so the investors who got in on the ground floor made more money than they thought possible on the amounts invested. Money usually isn't made by accident; it requires the right moves at the proper time. But knowing WHEN to move is very critical.

We could list numerous businesses that dowsing could be applied to, but that really isn't so important. Knowing how to apply dowsing IS. So let's take a peek at the proper procedure.

Dowsing instruments only answer three questions: yes, no and a movement in between that seems like a drag on a rod or a slight circling action for the pendulum. These feeble movements suggest the question should be rephrased because it doesn't fit as asked. Maybe your question rubbed on that of moisture when it should have been something like, "Is there too much moisture in the soil?" or another approach would be, "Is the irrigation water too salty?"

A contractor might be interested in bidding a job but has no notion what his competitors have submitted. He could ask such questions as, "Was the lowest bid submitted over \$200,000?" He might ask \$225,000 and continue upward with the figures until his dowsing indicated the correct low bid. If he could do the work for a lower price, he already knows what the lowest bid was, so now the job is his when he submits a lower price.

Possibly the same contractor dowsed the construction site and found there were problems with the ground a building might rest on that wouldn't support the weight of a heavy building without the added expense of driving pile, pouring wider and thicker footings or a number of other problems his competitors knew nothing about. With this knowledge to work with, he might figure the job again and submit a bid allowing for this. The low bidder might be forced to back out when he finally discovered the trouble, but he would have lost considerable money by then. The dowser with his ability to learn such things KNEW about it and included enough extra in his bid to cover costs. He makes money on the project, maintains a good reputation for being

prepared and is considered for any other work from the same people.

Reputations travel at tremendous speed sometimes and if there is anything wrong, expect it to crop up when it needs to be suppressed the worst. Once a contractor gets the reputation of being incapable of completing a job, his bid is generally kicked out without being opened.

It really doesn't matter whether you peddle apples on the street or manufacture toe nails for movie stars, there will be competition if it looks as though your business is prosperous.

The third answer dowsing equipment offers is no indication of either yes or no. When you asked a question and there seems no response at all, try asking it another way. Sometimes the rays die down temporarily and the same question later would be answered immediately by the reaction of the dowsing equipment. It's like fishing; unless the right bait is used, you may not make a catch. When dowsing is used properly, the rewards can be staggering.

Commercial fishermen will never have it so good until they learn how to locate fish by map dowsing, then go to that particular area. I was a commercial fisherman for seven years in the state of Utah, and we caught fish by the tons. The day I decided to quit the business, there were orders on my desk for twenty-three tons that we never filled. Back twenty years ago, \$300 a ton was darned good money for trash fish. Sometimes we hauled out ten tons a day, other times more and sometimes there would be less. Anyway, the waters we fished had a lot to do with the amount we caught.

There were times when the stream was small and cluttered with enough trash to hamper the operation. Under these conditions the tonnage dropped even though there might be ample fish. Or there were times when fish scatter and that causes more work to net a given amount that may be taken in a fraction of the time when the waters were normal. High waters make netting fish much harder.

Any fisherman, whether commercial or sportsman, can improve his catch by map dowsing before deciding exactly where to fish. He has the ad-



vantage of knowing where the most fish are concentrated as well as being able to determine the average size. The fisherman who depends on a rod for his catch can carry it a little further and douse the best bait for any species of fish. Several of our students claim they never had so much fun fishing until they learned how to apply dowsing to the sport.

There is no point in listing all the various businesses dowsing can be used in. The important thing is to learn how to ask the proper questions. More important is learning the proper way to use dowsing instruments. Whether you prefer bare-handed dowsing or one of the numerous instruments, the important thing is to be sure the answers you receive are correct. This means you must practice at every available opportunity. It means having the determination to become proficient. And it means you will be doing lots of dowsing before becoming good enough to depend on the answers from dowsing to apply it to your livelihood.

## **Radionics Around the World**

"I am constantly being knocked by the American Medical Association; but I don't mind it. I just keep right on with my work. It is no crime to be called a charlatan; the calamity lies in being one...I cannot blame the critics. Some years ago I would have called anyone crazy who said they could diagnose and locate disease from a blood spot. What I do object to is that they condemn without investigation ...In the beginning of my experimental work I thought the medical profession would welcome my discovery and assist in my efforts in applying it. But apparently it is a crime to endeavor to cure patients. As long as you only theorize it is all right..." These words were written by Dr. Albert Abrams, M.D. only four months before his sudden death in 1924.

Who is this Dr. Albert Abrams? He

is the founder of the science known today as radionics. Radionics has progressed a long way since Dr. Abrams first began to develop the technique he called the Electronic Reactions of Abrams or ERA, for short. Though the last half century has changed, the proponents of radionics still face the same persecution Abrams did. We're going to take a look at where radionics now stands, both here in the United States and in Europe.

The history of radionics is virtually impossible to trace. The present status of the science is the result of numerous men and women who had basic instruction and then went ahead to develop their own techniques. We owe a great debt to these courageous men and women. Unfortunately they will never receive the full credit due them. In this article we are dealing

with the present status of radionics, and we will leave its history to another article. We will be looking at the work of the three major researchers in the field: Bruce Copen, Delawarr Laboratories and Advanced Sciences Research and Development Corporation.

In the United States the only organization actively pursuing radionic research is the Advanced Sciences Research and Development Corporation in Georgia. The president and director of research is Dr. T. Galen Hieronymus. Dr. Hieronymus prefers the use of the word, psionics, over the commoner term, radionics. Hieronymus has been in psionic (radionic) research almost since its beginning. He has very impressive credentials including being a fellow of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers as a



radio engineer in addition to holding an honorary Ph.D. in physics. It is interesting to note that Hieronymus, like many other radionic researchers, has a background in electronics and radio.

In 1946, Hieronymus applied for a patent on his psionic instrument and three years later the patent was granted in the United States. His instrument is also patented in Great Britain and Canada. This is the first and only radionic device ever patented in the United States. Since that time he has continued his research and is today known as the dean of American radionic researchers.

In the 1950's, a series of articles appeared in *Astounding Science Fiction* by Editor John Campbell describing Hieronymus' research which sparked a lot of interest in his work. Numerous scientists sent for copies of the patent and in time built copies of the instrument. It will never be known how many investigated this technique.

Among his recent avenues of research are the monitoring of the physical condition of the astronauts on the space flights. He has published two papers giving a quantitative evaluation of the condition of the astronauts of Apollo 8 and 11. He has also used his psionic device to investigate the possibility of life on other planets. His results are quite startling. He has found that there are radiations of 17 or 18 organs in the human body coming from Venus. What exactly this means we'll have to wait and see.

The city of Indianapolis was the site of the U.S. Radionics Research Congress in 1975. This was the first meeting of radionic researchers in the United States in over thirty years. Papers were presented by various researchers discussing radionics and related areas. The press was on hand for this historic event and it received much publicity. In 1976, the Radionic Congress was repeated in Washington, D.C., again with much success.

The U.S. Radionics Research Congress was formed to further the cause of radionics and to make an effort at gaining scientific recognition for the fledgling science. It is interesting that several scientists including Dr. Will-

iam Tiller of Stanford University have expressed an interest in radionics. With this renewed interest maybe radionics will become accepted, in at least a limited way, and thereby allow many more people to benefit from its remarkable treatment and diagnostic capabilities.

There are, of course, numerous individuals, doctors and laymen alike, who are actively studying and researching radionics privately here in the United States. Some of these are doctors—M.D.s, N.D.s, D.C.s and D.O.s—who learned the skill many years ago and continue to employ it secretly. Others are people who have learned of radionics recently and were able to import equipment from England or to make their own. These instruments are used secretly, often to help relatives and friends regain and maintain better health. Doctors who use radionic instruments and have seen how effective they are, are often fearful that their equipment will be discovered and confiscated. One chiropractor here in California, after telling me of his numerous successes in treating his patients, expressed his fear that his radionic equipment may be discovered. He believes that God is protecting him owing to the valuable work he is doing in healing the sick.

In England, the situation is not quite so bad as it is here in the United States. Radionic practitioners are allowed to practice openly although they are restricted somewhat by various laws. The medical organizations have tried on various occasions to fight the radionic users, such as the lawsuit against Delawarr Laboratories in 1960. Delawarr Laboratories won the case but suffered heavy financial loss from the court costs.

There is in England, a Radionic Association which acts as a professional society of radionic practitioners as well as keeping interested laymen abreast of the latest developments in the field of radionics. Founded in 1943, the Radionic Association is now the major world body controlling the emerging profession of radionics. The Association also provides training for persons wishing to become qualified radionic practitioners. The school of

radionics was set up in 1962, and provides an extensive course of training in England. Graduates who pass the examinations and finish their 12-month probationary period are then allowed to become full members of the Radionic Association. They also produce two radionic instruments which are leased rather than sold to qualified members only.

There are two major researchers and manufacturers in the field of radionics located in England: Bruce Copen and Delawarr Laboratories. We will look at each of these groups separately. Bruce Copen is this year celebrating 30 years of actual research in the field of radionics. He is the author of several books on radionics and radiesthesia. He has designed and produced various radionic instruments which incorporate electricity in the circuit.

The Copen instruments have a built-in fundamental ray tuning system which allows the operator to easily tune the instrument to the patient automatically, thereby lessening slightly the adverse effects of the wandering mind. Some of his instruments also incorporate a device for the manufacture of homeopathic remedies. Since homeopathy is based on the energy built up in the little sugar pills, we are able to reproduce them radionically by radiating the pills with the appropriate energy. While this innovation was not originated by Dr. Copen, he is one of the few people who have it available in their radionic equipment.

Dr. Copen is involved in continuing research in this vast field and publishes new books as the information becomes available. Among his recent books are valuable information pertaining to radionics in connection with biorhythms and agriculture. He has also developed techniques for testing the radionic and dowsing ability of a person. At his laboratory he has facilities for doing radionic analysis and treatment. From here he regularly gives broadcast treatments to people the world over and has reported great success.

The other major researcher in Great Britain is Delawarr Laboratories in Oxford. The name George de la Warr is well known to anyone inter-

ested in radionics and he was certainly one of the pioneers in the field. His interest in radionics began in 1941, when he was asked to make a copy of the American Drown Diagnostic Instrument. Dr. Ruth Drown was a well known radionic practitioner and researcher located in Hollywood. She conceived many improvements in radionic equipment and is probably the best known name connected with American radionics with the exception of Dr. Abrams. A lot of publicity was due to her continual persecution by the American Medical Association and the Food and Drug Administration and her subsequent trial.

From this beginning de la Warr went into an intense study of radionics which he continued until his untimely death. Delawarr Laboratories is the Mecca for those seriously interested in radionics. From within the four walls of the laboratory come some of the most exciting research in the world. Scientists from around the world have visited the laboratory, and Russia even sent a scientist several years ago to study their work.

Delawarr Laboratories are noted for their scientific and technical work. They are also the only organization to

my knowledge currently doing research into radionic photography. A three-day course of instruction is available in the use of the instruments there at the laboratory. The method of detection on these top quality instruments is not the pendulum as with those made by Copen but is a technique known as the stick method.

In the Delawarr instruments there is a small rubber plate. A rate is set up on the instrument and the operator slowly strokes this rubbing plate with his fingers. If the condition indicated on the dials is present in that patient, a drag will be felt as the fingers move across the rubber. With some very sensitive or experienced operators an audible sound like a crack can be heard. This technique is probably the most common found in radionic equipment. We are still looking ahead to the day when a fully automatic radionic instrument will be built which will eliminate all human error.

These are the major centers of radionic research and development. It is, of course, being used around the world. There is much research being done into radionics in France. Since so much valuable scientific information concerning dowsing, especially in

the medical areas, has already come out of France, we can look forward to their producing much valuable information in the area of radionics. We will pass this information along to our readers as it becomes available.

Radionics since its inception has been primarily focused on the medical aspects of both diagnosis and treatment. Now we are seeing its expansion into other areas, mainly agriculture. Although the use of radionics in agriculture is not new, it is currently gaining new interest. Radionics has been successfully used to protect crops from harmful insects as well as increasing crop productivity. Much of the recent research around the world has been directed to this area.

We are currently seeing the impact of radionics around the world. With organizations and researchers like the ones we have looked at in this article making new discoveries every day, it will not be long before we see a much more widespread use of radionics in everyday life. Radionics is an important part of dowsing. We detect the same energies with either technique. This is just one more of the numerous ways in which dowsing and dowers can benefit all mankind.

## Locating Missing People

Trying to imagine how someone who has lost a member of his own immediate family feels is vague at best for the outsider. One must experience the worry and agony of not knowing whether the loved one is dead or alive, sick or well. The helpless feeling does not diminish at the failure of each search party who expends its utmost in an all-out effort to locate the lost one.

On the other end of the telephone line I have listened to parents and relatives plead for help. Maybe they had never heard of dowsing before they were suddenly so desperately in need of someone who could locate missing people. At that time who cares if the method used is unorthodox if it brings results? Would a moth-

er refuse to be reunited with her baby if she knew it had been found by map dowsing, or by someone following a dowsing rod?

Some things are much harder to find by dowsing than others. The person who is afraid of making mistakes usually limits his dowsing to finding underground water. Almost anyone who learns to dowse can become a whiz of a water dowser and build a reputation that is famous almost worldwide. He may not know anything else, but as long as he sticks to finding water, he doesn't need to.

Those who venture out to harder objects to find by dowsing will certainly find the twisting trails of missing people a challenge. In fact, anything that moves from place to place

such as automobiles, planes, boats, dogs and people leave a trail of radiation in every place they have been. The trails usually criss-cross back and forth until it might seem to the amateur there is just no way to straighten them out. But nothing is impossible for those with the determination to learn whatever they set out to do. Don't expect to be perfect, but take the setbacks in your stride and keep right on trying. If your efforts combined save the life of one person, how does one put a price on that single life? If you were forced to put a price on your own life at this very moment, how much would the figure be? So we place life above all treasures and do our level best to save as many as possible.

I must stress the extreme difficulty in locating people, especially those who have died or been murdered. It is far from an easy task to lay a map on a table and make locations without being in error. Any place a person has been for a time there will be a stronger radiation than if the person had just passed through without stopping. So it is these hot spots that usually cause the dowser to make erroneous locations.

The person being traced can mentally implant a stop along his route that radiates just as strongly as if he had actually stopped, even though no stop was made. If he were en route to a given place, but decided to stop at a motel for the night, a dowser would pick up a hot radiation at that motel. Instead of making the stop, the person changed his mind and continued on. You see it wasn't necessary for the stop to be made in order to leave a strong radiation that can be detected for many years. The dowsers trying to follow the trail of that person would need to know how to eliminate such hot spots from the maps he was dowsing. In this particular incident the radiation is implanted by merely THINKING of making the stop. So we would be dealing with a mental implant rather than the actual radiation of the person in question.

Whether a person walks, rides in an automobile, boat or plane, his radiation is left along the route traveled. His radiation remains in the vehicle; however, that vehicle can travel the roads without leaving the radiation of the person being hunted unless he is really a passenger or rides in the vehicle. In other words, no radiation would be found along a road the vehicle traveled unless the person being searched for was riding in it. At the time he leaves the vehicle, his radiation ends at that spot.

It is possible to concentrate on a spot across country that one has never visited. Through concentration a person can leave a mental implant as if actually being there, and the implant will remain for years afterward without diminishing. It is these handicaps the dowser works under when he dowses for missing people, so to be mistaken is the usual thing rather than the exception.

There was a young boy missing in

Wyoming last fall that I tried to help locate. This little fellow was only four or five years of age, almost blind and deaf. He had ventured away from the ranch house where he lived and a grand search ensued without results. I was called and asked for help which I tried to give from the scant information I received over the telephone. I had no map to work from, so I drew a rough sketch without really knowing the shape or boundaries of the property.

For several weeks people searched for the little boy without turning up a single clue. I picked up a stronger attraction northeast of the house than at any other direction. So I called back to relate my findings with the hope it might help. But the location proved to be a stack of baled hay where the youngster had enjoyed playing. His body was finally discovered where an animal had dragged it into a hole, and the legs were the only part visible. The direction was to the northwest of the home, so this is an example of how the radiation can be so tricky sometimes.

Locating people who are alive seems to be easier than for the dead. But here is another tricky place where the question, "Is this person alive?" can throw the inexperienced dowser. Why? Because the tissues continue to live for some time after the heart has quit beating. The fingernails and hair grow for approximately thirty days after the body is officially pronounced dead.

To curtail this mistake, which leads to erroneous information so many times, change the question to, "Is the heart still beating?" while concentrating on the person's name you are trying to locate. Another question would be, "Are the lungs functioning normally?" With the proper questions the dowser can determine whether a person is dead or alive, and be sure the information is correct.

There will be times when the skeleton is scattered due to animals eating the flesh. Parts of the body will be torn loose and carried a distance away. After the flesh has been eaten, mice and other small rodents eat the bones for the calcium they contain. Within time, all remains of the skeleton will completely vanish but the ra-

diation of the person will remain there forever.

For the amateur dowsers who have never experienced dowsing a map where violence or murder was committed, be alerted to the fact that a map may cause you to suddenly become angry without your knowing why. Several times while dowsing maps for treasures I have experienced this. The hair all over your body might stand on end similar to the bristles on a dog's back. You might suddenly experience a disgusting feeling without knowing where or what is causing it. You may experience an uneasy feeling or anything else that could be classed as discomfort. This is not at all unusual, so if and when it happens, you will understand why.

Not long ago I was asked to dowse a map where a man had been murdered by people who were trying to force him to reveal the site of his buried treasure. As I started the first sweep of the rod, the hair on my body bristled immediately. In fact, the feeling was so strong it was necessary to back off for a few minutes and calm down. But eventually I did dowse the map.

I found that the body had been bisected which was confirmed by the party who owned the map and was knowledgeable about the story. I found the head had been cut off, then he added, "After cutting off the head, the bandits threw it in a fire and roasted it." There were two distinct locations on the map for the location of the body.

After making the location of the body, I was able to find the treasure site. In this case I checked to see if there was a guarding spirit as there generally is under such conditions. Sure enough, the indication was exceedingly strong, so I knew this treasure would not be recovered even though the location is known.

There are many things connected with finding missing people that isn't generally understood throughout the dowsing circles. Sometimes a murdered body is easy to locate, then there are times when it seems an impossibility. If the dowser is persistent enough, he can usually work out the problems and find the body. It might be easier to locate the murderer and

trail him back to the site of the crime. One time it might be easier to solve it with one method, the next time with another. I have never found a system that is always fool-proof in locating missing people. One method works for me on some occasions, then fails on others.

I discovered a method that has worked better, at least for me, than any other system. I found that as long as I am dowsing in the direction of a person, the rod continues to hold to the radiation regardless of how many times I sweep back and forth. It's like the rod was locked at the tip of the antenna and swivels with the sweep while using the swivel handle; it doesn't release the lock.

If the person I am dowsing for is 180 degrees away, the rod locks tight on the initial sweep, holds for one backsweep, then releases the ray on the next initial sweep. This tells me immediately the person I am dowsing for is behind me.

Sometimes the rod locks to a place where the person had been but who then moved to another location. But it only holds to the radiation for one complete sweep, backwards and forwards, only to release on the second initial sweep. You can practice this on members of your family in order to see how effectively it works. Be sure to lock to the radiation instead of merely picking up the attraction or there will be a pull on each sweep without actually locking to the rays. The LOCK seems to be the key to this method of dowsing.

In order to become proficient in ANY dowsing it requires practice. Since my own work has centered more on other things, I have not become as proficient in locating missing people as I may have. We would appreciate hearing from anyone who has worked this problem out to a fool-proof method so UNITED DOWSERS can pass it along in future issues of your magazine. We do not claim to know all there is in dowsing, and if anyone has a better method of dowsing anything at all, we are always searching for more knowledge.

Like most dowers who have searched for missing people, I have had successes as well as failures. This

is an area where my own experiments have been too light, but one I plan to improve in. Many times large rewards are offered to anyone who can locate a missing person; however, we have never charged a cent for dowsing emergencies, nor in trying to help in whatever way possible. This is not an area where I could feel comfortable in making a charge since no one makes any money under such conditions and walks away feeling proud of it. How can a charge be made for finding a missing child? In my opinion this should be a mission of mercy.

About a year ago a small girl, aged six or seven as I remember, was kidnapped here in California, and a massive hunt ensued. The law was having no success, and as usual, thought nobody else had more capabilities. So when one of our former students, Earl Kendall, offered to show them her location in the desert, he was brushed off like a freak who had no business trying to help.

Earl didn't share the sheriff's enthusiasm toward running him off, especially when he KNEW the little girl's whereabouts through his map dowsing over a two-day period that revealed her movement during the night, then stationary position in the daytime. The kidnapper was getting too close to the Mexican border for him to lally-gag around just because the sheriff didn't want outside help. Earl headed for the Border Patrol in an effort to inform them of the girl's location. Wouldn't you know it? She was found exactly where he had been trying to show them all long, but not a single word of his assistance ever appeared in the papers. That really didn't matter since Earl wasn't out for publicity in the first place; he only wanted to see the kidnapper caught before he was successful in crossing the border. Too many white girls have suddenly vanished only to be drugged and shipped to the Arabs without finding a trace of them. Our government is fully aware of this traffic, as any law enforcement officer can attest. At least that's the word one picks up when he starts investigating the route through Mexico, Panama and on out toward Egypt from the radiation of the missing girls. So try as

you may, there are some cases you will never solve.

Last week I received a phone call from Chicago, where the party on the other end of the line was asking for help to find a 14-year-old girl who had vanished. Her father and friends were out searching the nearby fields for her body with metal detectors. I located her radiation in the lower part of California, then by dowsing, discovered that she is living with a man in his middle to late thirties. The family doesn't think so; they would rather continue searching the frozen fields and accept her as being dead than to admit to themselves she ran off to do her own thing. I am not so easily discouraged; the daughter is alive and well!

Another family from Canada, sent a picture of their teenaged daughter who was fed up with living at home. She is touring the United States, accompanied by a male companion. The pair are on the move so much it is almost impossible to give a location without being too late by the time the parents could intercept them. That fact fails to lessen the burden and worry of the family who would settle just for a phone call from the daughter. But children who run away from home generally have such a resentment that they don't care how much the parents worry. They may like the idea.

Young girls tend to head for California before being away from home very long. They have heard so much about it, and usually keep abreast of the activities of friends who have been there. It just seems like the thing to do. Keep this in mind and check the areas around beaches, large cities and especially towns in the vicinity of military bases. Sometimes service men forget to ask the age of a girl who is an easy mark for a friendly face, especially if she is faced with unemployment and no place for lodging.

Boys running away are not in as much danger; however, there are far too many falling into the hands of individuals who keep a sharp eye open for strays. Young boys are molested just the same as girls, and sometimes are held captive for that particular purpose. So the dowser may think he has

made a mistake when he discovers information of this kind from a map, but knowing it happens may make the difference between locating the runaway or missing him.

A year ago I was contacted to try and locate a teenaged girl who had disappeared in Canada. Her trail was easy to follow on the map, then for no apparent reason I lost it. Several attempts to trail her failed because I wanted to disregard what the rod indicated because I just couldn't accept it. I found where she was and wouldn't accept the location because it was too close to her home. Logic told me this was another runaway.

When she was finally found, it was a horrible story how a carpenter had kidnapped her, then held her captive in a small box-like compartment that was too small to stand up in. She had been starved to the point where there was very little flesh left on her tiny frame. She had been used for the kidnapper's pleasure while caged like an animal for something like five months. Her "cage" had never been cleaned and was so filthy from human excrement the scene was almost beyond description.

Food and water were provided on rare occasions, but not nearly enough. The girl had been starved to the point where she was unable to struggle or resist the captor. When found, she was barely alive. I may have saved her the agony of most of that cruelty by accepting the information my dowsing rod revealed. It was a lesson that sticks in my mind, and I hope all dowzers who read this remember it when trying to locate missing people.

Regardless of the item being dowsed for, we are nothing more than human. Humans make mistakes, sometimes by trying too hard. We can regret having made errors, but I would rather try and fail than be among those who are afraid to put forth the effort to try.

Although the radiation of a person may be all over an area, it can be reduced to the day and time of the disappearance by programming the mind. Think of the time when it was first discovered the person was missing and locate the radiation. Keep telling

yourself any radiation prior to that time will not be found, and ONLY the whereabouts at that time will radiate at all.

This procedure eliminates most of the false locations that would normally be found because the mind cancels out all radiation prior to the date of the search automatically. Allowing thoughts to creep in of areas where the person was known to be makes it harder to eliminate the hot spots that occurred before the disappearance and errors are made. It is important to rule logic out of the search in favor of gathering information by the use of the instrument.

Few people realize the dowser is capable of covering his trail by mentally repeating to himself, "I am leaving no trail." Most dowzers are ignorant of this fact until they reach the ranks of professionals. At that time their discoveries are generally guarded closer than a groom protecting his new bride. I have no doubt that this is the first time this dowsing secret has ever seen print. The following is an experiment that seems incredible; however, we would like to hear from members who test it thoroughly.

This experiment involves testing your own trail with dogs. I hope someone with an opportunity to check it out on bloodhounds will write and let us know the outcome so we can include the letter in another issue of the magazine. Simply tell yourself that your trail will smell like sulphur, and it cannot be trailed by dogs. Keep telling your mind this over and over during the test or there will be places where the smell of sulphur diminishes and your trail seeps through. If your concentration is appropriate, bloodhounds will not be able to pick up a trail you left a few minutes earlier. This is one of the tricks dowzers employ to protect their treasures from other dowzers who might search for them.

Many times people employ this method without realizing it. All they do is try to avoid leaving a trail that could be followed. In doing so, they actually obliterate their trail so completely dowzers would be behind the 8-ball. But the dowser can check for a covered trail, then upon finding it, he

must concentrate on "the trail that was covered." This allows him to follow the person because his mind is actually seeking the same trail but under another situation. Following the hidden trail becomes as easy as it would have been to trail the radiation if it has not been hidden.

There are times when trails lead dowzers through situations that are so unusual it is hard to imagine the missing person going to all that trouble. The human mind is impossible to completely predict; therefore, by trailing one who is doing his utmost to keep from being found, the dowser learns new tricks. It becomes fun to match wits with another dowser who is really sharp until he throws a curve that may require several months to straighten out. It is these games that make superb dowzers since they continually do just the opposite of what you might expect.

Dowsing clubs are starting to spring up across America, and if the club members employ such games, much knowledge may be gained. This is the training grounds for the amateur to progress to the professional level. It is the place for members to follow each other from one meeting to another, but only on days previously agreed on for practice purposes. Some of our students have made a game of following me from place to place as we travel on our training tours. We may travel in the motor home to one destination, then put it in storage and fly to another place. A few have been so accurate they called the motel where we stopped just a few minutes after we checked in. Why? They were checking their accuracy.

When map dowsing you might find the place where the victim was murdered and the radiation will be extremely strong. The body may have been taken to another place and discarded or buried. It's not easy to separate these sites at times, but with careful work while guarding against logic, the correct locations can be separated. It requires patience and sometimes drawing a sketch of the site in order to enlarge the map area to be searched. It is not necessary to work from aerial photographs or enlargements of pictures when all the dowser

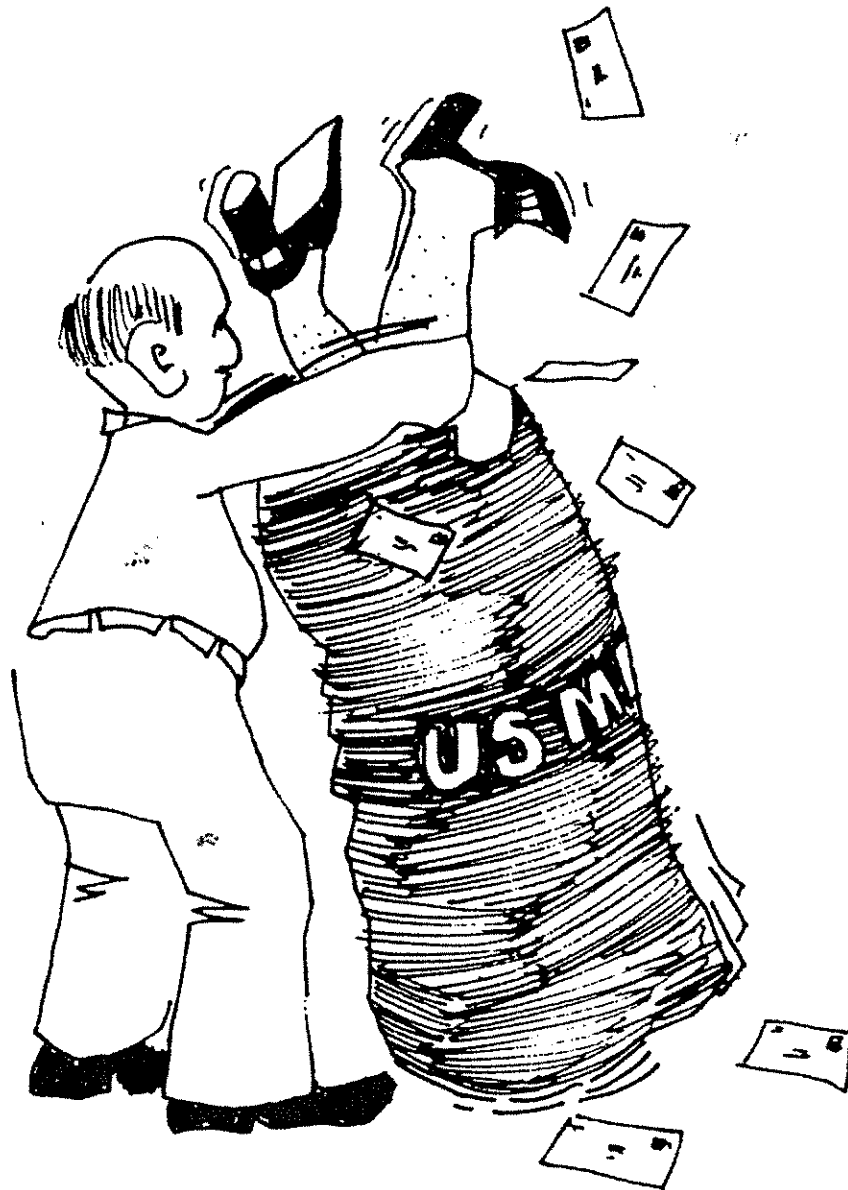
needs to do is draw the immediate location onto another sheet of paper and do his dowsing from it.

Although this fact has been stressed before, let me remind you once again that the age of a map has nothing to do with the radiation. The map carries no radiation of a lost person, mineral deposits or treasures; it is the MIND that locates items on maps as well as in the field. So the sketch drawn today

works just as well as a map printed fifty years ago covering the same area.

We realize there is much more that could be said about finding missing people. Dowsers interested in this facet of the science will enjoy the challenge of trailing friends who participate in the hobby at first. Soon the hobby will turn into more serious work after experience and knowledge is gained. You may be the hottest

dowser in the country for locating missing people quicker than anyone might imagine. Some dowsers progress so fast they amaze themselves in one facet of dowsing while falling flat on their faces in others. From past experience I know it requires determination and long hours of practice to step above the crowd of dowsers who dream of becoming proficient, then are too faint of heart to achieve it.

# Measuring Depth by Dowsing

By "LOBO"

The word, "incredible," seems to be lacking in force when it comes to describing how fantastic measuring depth is. To watch a dowser measure depth of a stream of underground water, oil or mineral deposits, and then see his stated depth proven, strong words are needed to even try and describe the seemingly impossible feat. Yet it happens day in and day out with an extremely high degree of accuracy, so what may seem impossible is really being accomplished worldwide by people knowledgeable in the dowsing methods.

Whether measuring depth in the field, or from a map of any given place in the world, or on outer planets, the methods and results are exactly the same. One of my plans for the future is to dowse and learn where the UFO's are coming from. I have already been able to determine some of the outer planets containing human life. The average seems to run something like 45% of the outer planets containing human life, then others contain life, but not that of the human variety. Some of these living beings live beneath the surface of their particular planets, as any dowser can verify.

Time has not allowed me to investigate to any degree of satisfaction since my mind asks the question why some people on other planets live underground, while others inhabit the surface. The reason may be due to intensive heat emitted from the sun, or there could be a variety of other reasons which do not immediately come to mind. Those who enjoy probing the unknown can have a ball with this problem because it entails measuring depth frequently in order to discover facts that to date are unknown.

We will deal with several methods of measuring depth; however, there are many more that are not so commonly practiced. The "Bob" system is

widely used, so let's see exactly how it works.

Anything in the form of an instrument from a limber switch, fishing rod, door spring, a length of plastic to whatever the dowsing instrument is constructed of will serve the purpose. I use the "Lobo Map and Field Rod" with the fiber handles attached for measuring depth by the "Bob" system, but any good springy instrument will suffice. So it is not necessary to purchase an expensive rod because you imagine it to be better for measuring depth than another.

For the beginner it will be best to practice on an object of known depth. A tin can buried a foot underground works fine. Grasp one end of the dowsing rod so the weighted end is away from your body. This will allow you to produce a bouncing or swinging action with very little effort. Holding one end of a "Y" rod works just as well as a straight fishing rod. Whatever instrument you use, the important thing is to have the weighted end away from your body.

Experiment with the instrument a few minutes in order to get the feel of the springing action, then ask how many inches the piece of metal is buried. Give the rod action by physically bobbing it up and down, then do not force action from that point on. Simply start counting the inches per bob until the rod appears to put on the brakes and stop. At that point you should be at the proper depth of the buried object, or at least within an inch or two. A little practice will improve your ability very quickly and you will be able to measure the depth of the water main serving your house, underground streams or counting UP to the proper height of the power lines overhead. This method works just as well for measuring up as it does for measuring down.

For deeper objects you would

count in increments of feet instead of inches. But how would a dowser go about measuring the depth of a deep deposit of oil? Would he count three thousand bobs for the three thousand feet down to the deposit? No, he would simply program his mind to measure 100 feet for each bob. For a deposit at a depth of 2,987 feet he would first count the 29 bobs equaling 2,900 feet and then program his mind to make each bob equal ten feet. The rod would now bob 8 times equaling 80 feet, giving us a total of 2,980 feet. By now programming the mind to make each bob represent one foot we can find the exact depth, in this case 7 bobs giving us a total of 2,987 feet from the surface down to the oil deposit.

Although not as commonly used, some dowsers use the circular motion of the dowsing instrument to count down and measure depth, or they use this method for measuring distance. Whether employing the bob system or the circular, both can be applied for the same problems. The rod is held by the tip end and a circular motion started as the dowser counts down as if using the bob system. Each circle represents a foot, ten feet or a hundred feet, depending on how the dowser has programmed his mind. The rod stops circling just as it stops bobbing when using the bob system when the proper depth is reached. You will find the straight dowsing instrument such as the tip end of a casting rod better for the circular method of dowsing than other commercial instruments. But the bob system works just as well on commercial rods as it does for any other.

One of the easiest systems I have ever found is the use of our depth rods (see ad inside front cover.) These rods are used for map dowsing where the depth rod is placed directly over the location on the map to be dowsed for



depth. Simply sweep in toward the tip of the depth rod which is placed on the map at 90 degrees from your dowsing position, then sweep back out until your dowsing rod locks. This should be the depth to the top of the object being dowsed. To find the bottom, simply think of the "bottom" and sweep again. This time the rod will lock further away from the depth rod to indicate the bottom of the object being measured. (Instructions are furnished with our depth rods.)

To measure depth with a pendulum program your mind for the instrument to circle to the right, to the left or to swing back and forth. I personally choose the clockwise circle, but you can choose either one since it makes absolutely no difference. The importance here is to not count too fast or the pendulum will continue to circle and indicate the depth deeper than it actually is.

The proper speed to dowse with the pendulum is something near five seconds between numbers, or even ten if you happen to be one who receives a slow reaction. The old adage that haste makes waste certainly holds true when measuring depth with the pendulum, so take a little more time than necessary for better results.

When the pendulum is adjusted to approximately six inches, start the circling action rather than wait for it to do something. Too many people have the notion that the pendulum should start from a perfectly still position to various movements on its own. Just remember the actions of a pendulum, or any other dowsing instrument, are the direct results of the reactions of your own nervous system. The nerve reaction causes the arm to move because the muscles contract and relax while dowsing as a direct result of messages received from the mind. It is better to start the pendulum moving and lessen the strain of dowsing than to sit like a wart on a toad waiting for miracles to happen. The pendulum will start moving as if by its own power if the dowser waits long enough. But pendulums do NOT move from their own power, so don't wait around for that.

Let's take a simple problem to practice with. Do you know how long your

leg is from the knee to the floor? Take the pendulum and ask yourself how many inches long it is, then start the circling movement of the instrument. Do not try to count each circle but count very slowly. The pendulum can circle ten times between counts, or twenty if necessary, but it will continue circling until you have counted the correct number of inches. At that time it will change from the circling action and start swinging to and fro.

Now try counting how far it is from your shoulders to the floor by the same method. Don't rush; take plenty of time. Within a few minutes you should be capable of measuring how many feet your own driveway is and hit the nail right on the head. Within an hour or so you will amaze yourself with your accuracy in measuring depth.

While writing the last paragraph, I received a phone call asking for help to locate an aged woman who has been missing for almost a week. The same system was used as I have just explained here. I find the missing woman to be approximately 700 feet northeast of her house (702 feet to be exact) and she died from a heart attack. Search parties walked within a few feet of the body and failed to find her due to extremely heavy underbrush. This was confirmed by a psychic friend of mine named Arlene Sierras. We are waiting for confirmation but feel certain the location will prove correct.

Another method of measuring depth is with the aid of the "Y" rod held in the hands as if searching for water. Concentrate on what you are trying to measure, then start slowly counting until the rod pulls down. The pull will be almost identical to when it twists out of the dowser's hands when an underground stream is located. But counting too fast results in the number higher than that of the depth you are seeking and the rod releases its pull before it ever really has a chance to pull down. Don't forget to take plenty of time, and if in doubt, count slower!

For practice purposes, measure the length of your house and discover how accurate the system is for measuring length. Always remember that meas-

uring depth is done exactly as measuring length. It is necessary to know which you are trying to discover, and your concentration on that question will certainly bring results. Errors will be made, but don't give up because learning to measure length or depth requires your undivided attention along with the determination to succeed. Knowledge is gained quickly as you practice.

Swivel-handled dowsing rods work very well by counting down as you make each individual sweep. Make sure your question is clear in your mind prior to making the sweep. Never make up your mind about a question DURING the sweep because that causes the rod to pass on by without having a chance to lock to your question. When the proper question is clear in your mind, sweep the rod for an answer. When it locks, your answer is "yes." It will pass on by for a negative answer.

The dowser may measure depth from the top of a body of water, or he can program his mind to only measure from the bottom of the lake, ocean or any body of water. The depth of the water and that of the mud on the bottom may be added together for a total depth of the item being measured. Dowsing through water is just as easy as dowsing through air because it is actually the mental ray that makes the location. Don't be misled because it must have the radiation from the emitting body in order for the mind to make the location. We are dealing with natural forces that have natural laws the dowser cannot work without or ignore. These natural forces are what really makes dowsing possible.

The only difference between measuring depth, height or distance is in the way the dowser programs his mind. Whatever he concentrates on is what the dowsing instrument reacts to, which can be the dimensions of a buried object. Depth rods are easier to use for measuring dimensions of a buried object, but they are not an absolute must because the task can be accomplished without them. The depth rods only make the job easier.

Doodlebugs may be used in the same manner to find the answers of distance, depth, height and dimen-



sions as any other instrument. The secret to any measurement is to count slowly, always allowing ample time for the instrument to react to the figure in your mind before proceeding to the next number.

Dowsers who use the bare-handed method feel heat in the palm of their hand as an indication of the proper depth. Some feel a tingling sensation, others a cool feeling, but the majority

describe the feeling as heat. This does not always happen in the palm of the hand, especially for beginners; but with practice that's the area where the sensation usually centers. Alma and I both feel heat in the palm of the hand when dowsing bare-handed, but I prefer the rod for better accuracy in my own dowsing.

Measuring depth can be learned within a short period of time, regard-

less of the type instrument being used if you are familiar with it. For one person who likes the pendulum, it would be harder to change to another type instrument. Use the same instrument you prefer in ordinary dowsing and don't be afraid to practice. Measuring depth is not a problem for a few because almost anyone can learn.
